Notes from the South Hill Orchard - October 2023

The first 7 trees were on planted back in June 2022 and they have all survived the hot and dry spells of the last 2 summers, albeit with some watering assistance in the first summer. Some sturdy tree guards have successfully resisted the attentions of the local wildlife. One tree even produced a small apple this year. They have not put on a lot of growth above ground yet, but in the first years, in a fairly open orchard, this isn't unusual.

The site is windy at the moment, though it is protected to some extent by a row of tall trees on the north side. This has been underplanted with some mixed hedging which, in the next few years, will thicken out the present hedge and provide a lot more shelter.

A further 20 trees are ready for planting this autumn with some stout tree guards. Some help would certainly be appreciated with this task! Contact Geoff or John <u>g.b.hardman@btinternet.com</u> or <u>orchard@south-hill.co.uk</u> for details

This would be a great opportunity for any children to plant a tree and watch it grow, just like the first 7 trees were planted by those in the parish as the photos show.



PLANT A TREE IN 2023

Apples have been the only trees planted so far, though it is planned to include other fruits in the future, perhaps when the site becomes more sheltered. So far, we have planted varieties commonly grown in the West Country in the last 150 years or so. We have avoided varieties that can be bought in the shops or commonly bought in tree nurseries. Apart from having a good proven record in our fairly wet climate, local varieties tend to resist pests and diseases better, partly because they have slightly thicker skins. This is important in an orchard where no spraying or chemical controls are planned.

We have planted eating and cooking apples and chosen varieties which are ready from August through to the end of the year. Some are sweet tasting, others sharp and crisp, but all taste quite different from the ones that can be bought in the shops.

Here are some details of the first 7 planted already.

Cornish Mother - A crisp apple used for both cooking and eating, ready from late September. The variety dates back to at least the 1880's. It was rediscovered as a single tree near Wadebridge. **Cornish Pine** - A large deep red and green aromatic apple, ready from late September with a hint of pineapple when fully ripe. At local tasting events, it has often been the most popular one. It dates back to the 1920's.

Devon Crimson Queen (or Queenie or Sops in Wine in Cornwall) - A sweet and aromatic apple with a lovely crimson skin and sometimes crimson inside as well. It's ready from late August early September. Very widely grown in the Tamar Valley and was known in 1920 but possibly dates back to 1820 as Devonshire Queen.

Hockings Green – A green cooking and eating apple, ready from late October for cooking, later still for eating. Popular in the 1920's - 1930's. Raised by Mr Hocking of Illand Farm, Coad's Green about 1860.

Oaken Pin - A sweet and aromatic apple, ready from October. It's great for juicing. Originates from the Exe Valley and Exmoor before 1876. A pin, incidentally, was a tapered wooden door stop, like the shape of the fruit.

Rough Pippin - A crisp apple, ready from late September. Originating from Somerset before 1884. It was discovered in Rezare in the 1980's. It tastes much better than the name would suggest.

Claygate Pearmain - A crisp apple, orange and scarlet striped. It's good for juicing. Ready from late October. Dates back to 19th Century to Surrey, but has been found in several local orchards in this area.

Footnote:- This year, many apples were ready a full month early than usual, possibly because of the very hot spell following by wet spells. A sign of things to come or just a one off?

St Petrocs Homeless charity in Cornwall.



Flapjacks

Ingredients 12 ozs Oats 5 ozs butter

5 ozs dark brown sugar 3 tbsp golden syrup Handful cranberries/dried fruit Island mix (optional)

Method

Preheat oven to 180°c/160°c fan/Gas Mark 4. Grease and line a 9" square tin.

In a large pan, melt the butter, syrup and sugar over a medium heat. Take the pan off the heat. Stir in the oats to coat with the melted mixture. Add dried fruit, cranberries, island mix etc if desired. Transfer to the tin and press the mixture down. Bake in pre-heated oven for 15-20 minutes until golden brown/crispy.

Tip - make this gluten free by using gluten free oats



For Savoury Flapjacks Ingredients 100g butter

250g porridge oats

2 medium carrots, grated

1 tbsp each milled flaxseed & chia seed (optional)

Seasoning to taste

100g mature cheddar cheese, grated 2 large eggs, beaten

Small bunch chopped chives/spring onions 1 tbsp sunflower or pumpkin seeds

Method

Preheat oven to 200°c/180°c fan/Gas Mk6 Line a 20cm square baking tray with baking parchment.

In a pan, melt the butter and add the oats, grated carrot and seeds. Add seasoning to taste. Allow to cool for about 10 minutes. Stir in the cheese, beaten egg and chopped chives. Tip into the tray and press down. Bake for 25-30 minutes until golden, and allow to cool completely before cutting into squares.

St Sampson's Window Restoration

Thirteen is a good number for St Sampson's Church. All thirteen windows have now been restored to their prime with the help of thirteen grant funders and three individuals. A grand total of \pounds 53,000 was the required target.


Our funding research took us in all sorts of directions and we made some fascinating discoveries. Many pleasant hours were spent wading through family trees and church records. We discovered we had connections all around the world, as well as a short distance down the road.



The chancel (south) window is dedicated to Major Percy John Rice (1810-1850) and Lucy Maria Elton (nee Rice) (1814- 1846), brother and sister of the then Rector of South Hill, Revd. Horace Rice. The inscription contains the words "Ah my brother! Ah my sister!" Lucy Maria was the great Great Grandmother of Julia Rice Elton, who we traced. She was unaware of her family window but delighted to discover it.

Another connection was made with Baron Lord Clinton. The Trefusis/Clinton family were closely involved with South Hill and Callington churches for many years. The Trefusis coat of arms appears in three places in St Sampson's: the west tower window, on shields on the south aisle roof and on a pew frontal.

I have a fascination with one particular dedicatee who remains somewhat of a mystery. A woman called Mary Fookes (1754-1812). I spent many hours on a Cornish misty November morning looking at every gravestone in the churchyard. I didn't discover her resting place, but feel she is here somewhere. I also sadly failed to trace any living relatives of hers, but maybe one day someone will trace themselves to St Sampson's church and Mary's window.



My favourite window for its images is in the Manaton Chapel. The righthand side shows Edward White Benson (1829-1896), the first Bishop of Truro (1877-1882) and later.

Archbishop of Canterbury (1883-1896) holding a model of Truro Cathedral. St. Sampson of Dol, the patron of our church, is depicted in the centre and Frederick Temple (1821-1902), Archbishop of Canterbury after Benson, is on the left-hand side. Beneath these figures are pictures of a sower, a reaper and a gleaner representing not only the biblical allusions but also the agricultural nature of the parish of South Hill and the fact that the dedicatee family were farmers in the parish.

The work finally started, after further delays caused by bat legislation, in November 2021. What a wonderful moment in

January when the first three restored windows were replaced. I don't think anyone realised exactly how much difference it would make. No more rusty bars, no more wobbly glass panes, simply beautiful windows letting in the light and allowing us to see the trees outside.

Five more windows were taken out in the intense heatwave of August 2022 and put back in December, amid freezing temperatures. The inscriptions could all now be easily read, the colours of the stained glass vibrant and fulsome. It felt like a true honouring of the families Trehaine, Body, Dunston and my mystery lady, Mary Fookes.

The final five windows were removed in May 2023, including the East window, which was a sad sight to see boarded up, but glorious when replaced in August. By the end of September 2023 all our windows were back.

How wonderful that all our windows are now fully restored. Watching the skilled heritage craftsmen of Dan Humphries Stained glass Ltd and C.F. Piper & son at work has been amazing. Their knowledge is immense, and we are very grateful to them for the sensitive restoration that they completed. And it came in under budget!

The Government and Cornwall Council want us to recycle better.

It's important to understand the new changes happening here, in the NEW YEAR. You'll need to recycle everything you can once the new food waste, recycling and rubbish collections are introduced in our area.

Rubbish collections will be limited to 180 litres fortnightly, not unlimited weekly as now. The new bins are for waste only, everything else should be recycled. Anything that does not fit into the 180-litre wheelie bin will not be picked up by the council. A reusable sack is an alternative to the bin.

Rainy Days



It is difficult to believe that, not that long ago, at the height of summer, it felt like autumn. Northern Ireland and parts of England had the wettest July on record. Then, a month earlier, it was even harder to imagine that we had the warmest June on record! The weather affects our moods; especially if it keeps us inside for days on end.

Historians reckon it was the Achilles heel for the Romans and contributed toward their demise. Tacitus records Caesar saying:

'The nights are short and the weather miserable, with frequent rain and mists'.

Archaeologists have shown that settlers during this period suffered from lack of sunshine and vitamins (due to the scarcity of fruit) and they were often seen off by flu.

Rain frequently figures in songs to describe the melancholic soul:

Sunny days Where have you gone? I get the strangest feeling you belong Why does it always rain on me? Is it because I lied when I was seventeen? (Travis, 1999)

It is strange then to think that, in warmer climates, rain is viewed in a different light. We see this in the Bible. Paul speaking in Lystra to the Greeks, said:

'Yet he (God) has not left himself without testimony: He has shown kindness by giving you rain from heaven and crops in their seasons; he provides you with plenty of food and fills your hearts with joy.' (Acts 14:17)

In El Jem, in Tunisia, which is close to the Sahara, there is a huge Colosseum. Part of Gladiator was filmed there. The temperature there was an unbearable 48 degrees Celsius in July. Tunisia faced its worse drought on record. It is hard to get our minds around the level of heat and drought many have to endure, as we sat here in the UK during a miserable summer downpour.

Yet rain is such a blessing, because it tells us that God is kind and cares for our needs. It is vital for growing food and something which brings us joy. Kindness, we are told, is a fruit of the Spirit and is something that takes time to grow and ripen in a Christian's character. So, whenever it rains, let us work at being kind to everyone, especially the poor and needy; whether they are on our doorstep or live in far-away arid places.

South Hill Parish Council meeting

Details of the meeting held on 17 October 2023 included the following topics:

COUNCIL MEMBER: The council will hear soon as to whether an election is needed for the vacant post. If not, then the council will seek to co-opt a new member over the next month or so.

GRANITE TROUGH: The council agreed that the trough should be placed next to the entrance to the playing field in Golberdon.

RECREATIONAL FIELD: Arrangements are being made for the hedges to be trimmed. It was agreed that the football club can erect storage shed similar to and in the same area as the cricket club shed.

EMERGENCY PLAN: As a consequence of changes in personnel, the contact names on the emergency plan should be changed to:

It is requested that distributed copies should be changed locally.

FOOTPATHS: The contract for path cutting is still ongoing with some work done but with a meeting with the contractor identifying a few locations on particular paths that still need attention. Consultations continue with Cornwall Council regarding the acquisition of a stile for the Woodlands path.

REMEMBRANCE DAY: Arrangements were made for the service on **Saturday 11th November at 2.30pm** at the War Memorial at Golberdon crossroads. Notices were distributed for notice boards.



HAULAGE LORRIES:

Update regarding the haulage movements going through Maders and Golberdon. Following discussions between Chairman Dan Smith and Mr Glynn Le Marquand this statement can be made:

Just over 50% of the expected deliveries have taken place to date.

As the delivery schedule is controlled by the site of origin, it is not possible to predict when the deliveries will take place, nor can a definite end date be provided.

The haulage company have been contacted to request that deliveries are made in stages, where possible, so that there isn't a convoy of lorries blocking the lanes.

The roads are being regularly swept to clear any debris and repairs have been made where necessary.

Both the Environment Agency and Cornwall Council have made visits to the site to confirm compliance with the licence that has been issued for the work.



The names of those on our war memorial.

Private John Garfield Doney Aged 21 The London Regiment. Son of William & Martha Doney, Wagmuggle. <u>Read more</u>

Private Thomas Drew Aged 29 The Somerset Light Infantry Son of Mr & Mrs William Drew from Pensilva <u>Read more</u>

Private Percy Jenkin Aged 22 The Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry. Before enlisting, he lived at Manaton where he worked as a waggoner. <u>Read more</u>

Private William Gordon Landry Aged 24 The Essex Regiment Son of William & Elizabeth Landry, Trevigro. <u>Read more</u>

2nd Lieutenant Herbert Gloyne Forster-Morris Aged 19 The South Wales Borderers Only son of the Reverend Herbert & Mrs Forster-Morris, the Rector of South Hill. <u>Read more</u>

Private William Nicholas Stephens Aged 28 The Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry. Son of Stephen & Harriet Stephens, of Pear Tree Row, Callington. <u>Read more</u>

Sapper Vernon William Buckingham Aged 21 The Royal Engineers Uncle of Jill Reynolds & Shirley Shears. <u>Read more.</u>

Also remembered from this parish, but not named on the war memorial.

Able Seaman Stanley Jenkin, brother of Percy. Aged 18 Lived at Trewassick where he looked after the cattle. <u>Read more</u> also

Chief Petty Officer John Henry Dennis Chief Stoker aboard HMS Earnest. Drowned aged 39 <u>Read more</u> and **Petty Officer Aaron Rogers** on HMS Vivid died aged 40, awarded the Distinguished Service Medal for his part in the battle at Gallipoli. Both are buried in South Hill churchyard. Their graves can be found next to each other in the row of graves nearest to the road wall. <u>Read more</u>

Also remember not previously listed: **Private Herbert Dawe** <u>Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry</u> died aged 23 in France, son of Richard and Hannah Dawe of Trewoodloe <u>Read more</u>

Plus on 2nd April 1826 a baby by the name of **George Symons** was baptised in the font at St. Sampson's. At the age of 30 he was one of the first people to be awarded the Victoria Cross for 'conspicuous gallantry under terrific fire' during the Crimean war.
